home. ..

James Packer is correct when he informs us that "family worship was . . . vitally important [to the Puritans]. Every home should be a church, with the head of the house as its pastor. Daily and indeed twice daily, the Puritans recommended, the family .. should hear the word read, and pray to God."

Unfortunately, this Puritan commitment to family worship slowly weakened. .. What would these [former] men say about family worship in our homes today? I suspect that they would not be impressed. Is it any wonder that we are seeing the breakdown of the .. family in our society? Is it any wonder that so few children raised in Christian homes embrace their parents' Christianity? Is it any wonder that when contemporary Christians hear about the concept of family devotions, they think of it as old-fashioned, puritanical, and out-of-style?

Whatever our contemporaries may think about family devotions, I believe it's a vital practice for the health of our families, our churches, and our society. Pastor Jerry Marcellino refers to it as the "Lost Treasure" that needs to be "rediscovered." ... Family devotions is a practice that needs to be restored in our homes.

Alexander defines family devotions as "the joint worship rendered to God by all the members of one household." ..

To begin with, ... we find two levels of worship. On the one hand, the Bible speaks of worship as a "way of life":

Therefore I urge you, brethren, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies a living and holy sacrifice, acceptable to God, which is your spiritual service of worship (Romans 12:1).

On the other hand, the Bible also speaks of worship as formal religious act:

Ascribe to the LORD the glory of His name; Bring an offering and come into His courts. Worship the LORD in holy attire; Tremble before Him, all the earth (Psalm 96:8-9).

This is what we have in mind when we speak of "family devotions." ... Those acts of worship would usually include the reading and teaching of Scripture, the offering of prayer, and the singing of praise.


