introduce them to Christ and demonstrate with her life what it means to be a believer.

Instead, she found herself running copy machines and staplers, and handling the hundreds of little chores that spring up in a busy office.

When she reported to our church, Andrea mentioned some important lessons she had learned from her stay in Colombia. One of them was flexibility-being able to adjust. What we anticipate in our service for Christ may not be what is actually experienced out there on the field.

Because of glowing reports from Christian workers and the aura of miraculous blessing that often accompanies concepts such as "ministry," "short-term missions," and "fulltime service," we often formulate highly idealistic expectations. Then comes reality-and major disappointment.

Maybe you find yourself in a situation where things are nowhere near what you thought they were going to be. Classes are a drag, roommates are difficult, the "perfect job" is turning out to be a big-time pain, or a relationship is not as you anticipated. With the help of Christ, Andrea had the maturity to jettison her expectations and accept reality as it came. As a result, she made a good contribution to some people who very much needed her-and to the cause of Christ.

You can do the same! —DE

When 20-year-old Andrea Ness left for a 3-month missions stint in Colombia, South America, she was expecting to work at a residential home for homeless and troubled girls in Medellin, the drug capital of South America. When she got there, Andrea learned that the home had been firebombed and that the government had closed all resident facilities.

Now she had to work in the office. How boring!

Through this experience, Andrea learned a valuable truth about Christian service. Expectations rarely (if ever) square with reality. Andrea had envisioned living in a dorm with the girls and doing lots of exciting oneon-one work with them. She was going to help them escape the druginfested, dangerous subculture of which they were victims. She would

[8] I am sending him to you for this very purpose, that he may know your circumstances and comfort your hearts, {9} with Onesimus, a faithful and beloved brother, who is one of you. They will make known to you all things which are happening here."
