

"New Research on the State of Discipleship" A Research by the Barna Group in December 2015

Christian adults believe their churches are doing well when it comes to discipleship:

52%

"Their church definitely does a good job helping people grow spiritually"

40%

"Their church probably does so"

Additionally, two-thirds of Christians who have attended church in the past six months and consider spiritual growth important say their church places "a lot" of emphasis on spiritual growth (40%); another 27% say their church gives "some" emphasis.

Church leaders, conversely, tend to believe the opposite is true:

"Churches are doing very well ate discipling new and young believers"

60%

"Churches are not discipling 'not too well"


Looking at their own church, only **8%** say they are doing "very well" and **56%** "somewhat well at discipling new and young believers." Thus, pastors give their own church higher marks than churches overall, but few believe churches—their own or in general—are excelling in discipleship.

It implies the acceptance in mind and life of the views and practices of the teacher




Discipleship is making learners of Christ out from the nations of the world (v 19)

A disciple must be faithful, willing and teachable (2 Timothy 2:2)

It's a Personal Call (v 19)



"Go"

A passive participle, not an imperative verb. So it is more correct to say "as you are going"

Christ's program for discipleship is for all Christians because all Christians are in the process of "going"

There is a King. There is a Kingdom. And there is an urgent task to win and disciple the lost unto His kingdom. You have a mission in life. The call is for YOU. And the time is now (Edmund Chan)



It's a Powerful Call (v 18)




Jesus said, "All power is given unto me in heaven and in earth"

We have Christ's power...


Holy Spirit

Jonathan Dodson "There's a Discipleship Crisis in the Church Today"

In the US, this year 3,500 churches will close, this month 1,500 pastors will leave the ministry and today approximately 7,575 people will move on from church. Of those who move on, some never affiliate with a religion again saying they just "gradually drifted away from the religion"

In the UK, Steve Doughty published an update on December 11, 2012: Christianity has declined sharply over the past decade. Numbers who choose to call themselves Christians fell by more than 4 million. Fewer than 6 out of 10 or 59% now describe themselves as Christian. A decade ago nearly three quarters, 72% did so.

Chronic spiritual infancy is the ecclesiastical norm. Superficiality, immaturity and carnality characterise many Christians. Many church members don't grow towards spiritual maturity, much less reproduce spiritually. (Edmund Chan)

Ken Ham & Britt Beemer conducted a survey on those who had left the church

Only 11% did so during the college years

Almost 90% of them were lost in middle school and high school

About 40% left during the elementary and middle school years

By the time they got to college they were already gone

About 60% of the children and teens sitting in our chairs and pews each Sunday will disappear in the coming years
